

FEBRUARY '93





The weather was perfect for our planned trip to Brush Island.

We departed on the 'Warrigal' in Ulladulla Harbour at 9.00am and arrived at our first destination about one hour later. Divers descended to 27.5 metres to find the remains of a large boiler hoop from an old wreck about 4 metres in diameter. This was rather spectacular on approach as it was surrounded by large schools of fish and marine life including trumpeter, old wives, wirrah, lots of soft coral, hydrocoral, gorgonia and bayozoan.

We had a short surface interval (there were some who were suffering from the dreaded sea sickness) and proceded to gear up for our second dive.

This was a relaxed dive on a drop off on the north eastern side of Brush Island. There was lots of growth including giant



ascidians, sea urchins and commensal shrimp. Steve Shaw was knocked out of his playful mood when his new found friend (a cute little cuttlefish) bit his finger! On Sunday we stayed local and dived on 'Home Bommie' - an old favourite Ulladulla dive spot situated just outside the entrance to Ulladulla harbour. We entered the water at about 10.00 am and descended to a depth of 21 metres. We followed the wall along to the cave and swam through to the anchor, did a bit of exploring and back again. Marine life consisted of grouper, maori wrasse, white eared wrasse, blue devilfish, cuttlefish and reefish, nudibranchs and fan worms.

Some members and friends stayed over on the Monday and Tuesday, however the weather changed and it wasn't possible to do any more diving. Tim had his birthday on the Saturday so we all helped him to celebrate on Saturday night.

people saw when they hit the bottom. Around the next rock was a clone of the first one stretched out on the sand. Many others were spotted in the gutters. There were many morays, most of which were quite tame and easily coaxed out into the open. There were large schools of yellowtail and tailor and the usual over-friendly groper hanging around. Everyone saw a large turtle and some divers saw a moorish idol.

This was the only dive on Saturday as the wind just kept getting stronger so everyone had a fairly easy afternoon on land. That night we all headed off to Pacific Palms Resort for a communal BBQ with Tony and family. After this we all sat around a roaring log fire until the time came to head back to Forster.

The wind blew all that night and was still going strong on Sunday morning.

Nevertheless we were all ready on the wharf at 7.30 am where we decided to try for a double dive, the first being Diamond Reef about 30 mins north. This would probably be a pretty good dive when conditions are good but on this day it was a bit of a write-off! Most people gave it away after about 20 mins. The vis was only about 5m and the surge did not help.

Nevertheless there was plenty of life around - sponges of many kinds, pink and green soft corals, an unusual purple seatulip and a purple bryozoan which I had never seen before. Twenty seven varities of nudibranchs are supposed to inhabit this reef but we only found two. There were blotched and falcon hawkfish, which are common in sponge gardens, and we spotted a southern coral fish just before commencing our ascent.

Back on board the conditions were getting worse making for a very rough ride. Some elected to try for a second dive anyway. Rodger Clark astonished everyone by 'mooning' while standing on one leg in a rocking boat. This was enough to make one

of our more squeamish divers rush to the side to throw up!

Six divers went over the side at Latitude Rock in much better conditions. The vis was back to 12m with a depth of 15m. It was a very easy dive and very enjoyable. Wobbies were again everywhere. There were plenty of fish around including banner fish, pineapple fish and a black angelfish which was a new one for all who saw it. There were also some spotted puffer fish amongst the schools of bullseyes. That was the end of the watersports for Sunday. We were all back on land by about midday with the wind still howling. Most people opted for a lazy afternoon while three of us went for a drive up Cape Hawk and then down to McBrides Beach which is relatively unspoilt and unknown being a bit difficult to get to. That evening, Sue and I stayed on the campsite while the rest (collectively known as Catterson's Clowns) headed for the night spots and singles bars of Forster where they raged until well after 8.30 pm. 

New bag limits placed on local sea creatures

The new limits, which took effect on May 1, were introduced by the Minister for Natural Resources, Ian Causley.

"The animals living be-tween low and high tide." are coming under increasing pressure from human foraging," Mr Causley

said.
"Collectors have wreaked havoc on the intertidal zone by denuding the foreshores, and by using destructive harvest ing implements such as crowbars."

Further protective ac-tion is likely to occur in the next few months, when certain intertidal zones will be totally pro-

tected from foragers.

"Action is urgently needed to protect areas which are being depleted and to allow these areas to provide the breeding populations to re-colonise adjacent areas, 'Mr Caus-

ley said.
"This will be achieved by total closures to invertebrate collecting in

said.

NSW Fisheries has pub-lished a four-page leaflet detailing the new limits.

The new collection limits are: 10 bait crabs; 20 beach worms; 50 pipis, cockles and mussels in total; and 20 snails, limpets and chitons.

Octopus is completely protected on open rock platforms and in Sydney Harbour.

Regulations also target the methods of harvest-

Pipis and cockles may be taken only by hand and beach worms can be taken by hand or with pliers.

Yabbies, blood worms and squirt worms may all be harvested by yabby pump, upturned tin can, shovel or pitchfork, but only in certain areas.

On rock platforms, the only acceptable harvesting implement is a single-blade knife — mattocks, chisels and crowbars are banned.



The NSW Albatross Study Group has asked our club for assistance in helping them understand more about the Common Cuttlefish (Sepia Apama). These creatures are an important food source for all species of Albatross and Dolphins. They are readily identified by 3 small erect palps over each eye. Males are more heavily coloured than females and on average, larger, growing to over one metre in length. Sightings between Sydney and Jervis Bay are of particular interest. MONTAGUE ISLAND October Long Weekend



To their great surprise a new colony of NZ seals arrived on the island just three weeks before. These seals are much more friendly and approachable than our "aussie" seals (so Geoff says) and they were able to get so close they could even stroke them and play with them on the surface.

Diving off the NW corner it provided perfect shelter from the north easterly wind which was developing.

WRECK DIVE - "THE HILDA"

"The Hilda" was a 38 metre single screw, steel steamship which was carrying coal from Port Kembla to Sydney when it struck rocks at North Head, Bates Bay and sunk in about 24 metres of water. Alas... there is not much left of 'The Hilda' and on this day 11 divers from the club set out to explore what little remains of the old ship.



But...it was not to be! Due to limited visibility no one actually found the wreckage even though Les Caterson (one of our motley crew) has taken many divers there before.

For most of us however it was a worthwhile dive because it washed the cobwebs out of our wetsuits and conditioned them for lots more diving coming up.



BROUGHTON ISLAND Sunday 14 th October

Geoff and Beydon decided to take a gamble on driving to Nelson's Bay even though the weather was not encouraging for diving.

Unfortunately the seas were too rough to go to Broughton so Action Divers decided to go offshore to the south west corner of Cabbage Tree Island.

Marine life they encountered were magpie morwong, blue groper, a small cuttlefish and a very large leatherjacket as well as a small numb ray under the sand. Vis was about 6-8 metres.

It was very windy so Geoff and Beydon decided not to have a second dive.

SHELL HARBOUR - BASS POINT Sunday 14 th September

Once again Geoff and Beydon (now becoming regular dive buddies in the worst weather conditions) bravely drove down the coast through wind and rain with the hope of having a memorable dive. With a strong southerly blowing they decided to try diving a big gutter which was situated not far from the amenities block.

The water was dead calm at the entry point and thus made easy access in and out.

The gutter itself headed north and initially just had lots and lots of kelp as it descended slowly for about 200-300 metres to a depth of 21 metres. Here it opened up into a beautiful sponge garden quite unexpectedly with overhangs and many cone shaped sponges. They also saw some red morwong, basket stars and one very large cuttlefish out in the open water. After the dive they had some lunch and then the sun came out and it cleared into a beautiful sunny day.....typical!





FOUR Shire scuba divers are alive today – thanks to a dog called Lucy, a photographer's floodlight and a Sans Souci fisherman's knowledge of local waters and who uses them.

In a million-to-one chance, the divers were found roped together for survival and bobbing nearly three kilometres out from shore in storm-tossed seas.

They were near exhaustion after have been in the water for nearly three hours.

Their own boat had snapped its anchor rope and had drifted away.

The incident occurred when Heathcote diving expert Les Caterson went to the Osborn Shoal, a reef 2.5 kilometres off North Cronulla, with three companions on the holiday weekend.

They tumbled off his five-metre dive boat, Le Cat, and spent 45 minutes on the reef where one of the group, a photographer, took pictures.

While they were underwater, a 50km/h southerly

While they were underwater, a 50km/h southerly swept across Bate Bay, snapping the anchor rope and releasing their boat.

Still aboard the now drifting craft was Les's pet

When the divers surfaced, they saw they had no boat, so dropped their weight belts to increase buoyancy and clung to the anchor rope to minimise drift in the hope they would be rescued.

But rescue did not come, so later they cut off a section of the anchor rope and tied themselves together for safety.

Meanwhile, to the north of the potential disaster scene was Sans Souci charter fisherman Karl St John, 30, aboard his craft CatDive.

Karl had bought Cat-Dive from Les six months

ago.
"When the southerly blow hit us, we decided to fish for just a little longer because we were on to some good ones," Karl

"Twenty minutes later we headed home towards Port Hacking.

"On the way we spotted a boat about 300 metres out from the rocks near the "stink pipes" at Boat Harbour.

"I swung across to find the boat empty, apart from a dog.

"I recognised the dog as Les's pet Lucy.

Les's pet, Lucy.

"Lucy also recognised my boat because she climbed the rail and tried to jump across. I had to tell her to go back... and she did.

she did.
"We secured a line and took it in tow.

"But I noticed it was flying a blue and white 'Divers Below' flag.

"I realised that somewhere in the ocean there were bound to be divers including Les. They would be in trouble."

Karl searched his memory for where divers operated and remembered immediately the Osborn Shoals.

"By this time visibility was down to half a kilome-

tre.
"I headed towards the shoal and asked some of the men in the fishing party to go to the bow and keep a lookout.
"We'd travelled about

"We'd travelled about two kilometres when we saw the flash of a bright

light.
"One of the divers had carried a powerful floodlight for underwater film-

"He was shining it in our direction," Karl said.


