### Another seal diving weekend in Jervis Bay in August!

### Friday 17 – Sunday 19 August

Optional shore dive Friday – come down early and we'll get a local dive guide to show us around.

Double boat dives Saturday and Sunday (including one dive with the seals).

At least one dive will be with the seals, conditions permitting! The remainder will be boat dives to local dive sites.

We have done this trip the last two years running and have been blessed with top conditions both times, so hope we can do the same again. The house is perfect for our group and Ulladulla dive are very accommodating.

#### Diving – costs to be confirmed with dive shop, but costs from last two years were as follows:

- Retail rates for double dives is \$110 (\$90 for 10 divers or more, plus one free of charge)
- Airfills for \$7
- No tanks provided if you take one tank and they provide one it will be an added charge of \$10.00, or you can hire both tanks (or take 2 of your own!)
- Rayment in full required beforehand I will collect money in advance and pay in one transaction. Refunds for cancellation due to bad conditions.


I have booked the house, "Seahaven" http://www.stayz.com.au/11509

For each event a number of films are selected. Our evening consisted of:


Film one: The Krill is gone

## Wednesday Boat Dives

We have been out a bit lately. Some of the dives have been:

### 28 March 2012 - Pizza Reef

A bit of slop, but not too bad. Not as good as the weekend in viz terms, but lots and lots of fish. Normal bastard trumpeters, and huge numbers of silver sweep, one-spot pullers, yellowtail and sea pike all over the reef. Pity the sun was not out as it would have been even better. A brilliant dive. Visibility fair.

### 4 April 2012 - Middle Ground

Saw a pod of dolphins on the way there. A long rolling swell, so decided to dive deeper. Even at 32m we were being pushed around. Viz was down on the weekend. Huge numbers of yellowtail, one very fat wobbegong, lots of leatherjackets. Nice dive. Visibility fair.

### 2 May 2012 - Maccas Reef

A few larger swells but smooth. Lots of sea pike, found one eastern blue devilfish and a pineapple fish. Some smaller cuttlefish, black reef leatherjackets and lots of one-spot pullers. Very nice dive. Visibility very good.

## Dive The Poor Knights By Ian Roffey.

A recent wedding for my nephew in New Zealand provided the ideal opportunity to explore The Poor Knights Islands as a dive site. The wedding was on a Saturday and the bride very kindly got me a brochure for Dive Tutukaka the operator serving the islands.


So I arranged to spend an extra day there and headed out for a day of diving.

Tutukaka itself is a sheltered anchorage on the East Coast of New Zealand's North Island about a three hour drive north of Auckland. This is where the wedding was to be held.

It is a beautiful spot with limited accommodation and lots of expensive boats and weekenders.

A gather it is more a playground for the NZ upper class as there didn't seem to be much else there.






I only had one day to dive and thankfully the weather held out as there were major swells coming through and diving for the next few days had been cancelled already.

The dive boat operator is efficient with five dive boats visiting various sites around the islands. Nice and comfortable with plenty of room.

Once we get to islands the rear of the boat is anchored nice and close to the rock face, they even have



controls on the rear deck to facilitate this.

Our first dive site was North Arch and the rock face drops to about 20m underwater and the boat is only about 10m away, nice and easy.

The dive is fantastic, heaps of fish life, plenty of snapper and Lord Howe Island cod. Apparently the Islands are fed from the same North Eastern Australia current as Lord Howe Island.

A lot of the fish larvae are swept down on the current and attach themselves to kelp on the island where they grow.

However, critically, the fish do not reproduce as the waters are too cold.

You even get breeding pairs formed of some species but they do not reproduce.

Some of the smaller reef species simply die out in the winter and are re-stocked by the current in the warmer months.

That is the life cycle of the Islands. The arch goes down to 40 m and is quite a nice swim through and not far from the boat. Whilst I was there the temp was 20 degrees, pretty much the same as Sydney.

After the dive we get taken to one of the tourist spots where they actually take the dive boat into a cave in the island.

It's quite spectacular because you don't actually know it's happening till you realise they are actually going inside the cave.

We don't actually dive in the cave but in the area outside. There are lots of kelp beds and large

proliferation of life in among the kelp and the surrounding rock face and ledges.

I saw a mosaic moray ell and hermit crabs the size of footballs.

Once again, a nice dive and very close to the boat.

The trip back was also very rough, but in all it was a good day for diving and I would recommend them to anyone heading over the ditch for period of time. Even, as in my case, it was only a long w/e.



### Easter 2012 Jervis Bay Trip - By Ray Moulang.

Once again Easter rolled around and one of our favourite trips to JB was on. Over the last few years we have had some excellent weather and so we have been into the caves on the outside coastline and it was hoped that again we could do these.

In attendance we had six club divers and one non-diver staying in an untried house at Sanctuary Point and this proved to be a winner again, enough room for people, boat and cars. Close to local club and amenities.

Present were Ray Moulang, Andrew Moulang, Tallese Skinner, Mark Ridsdale, Vera Macgregor and Mike Scotland.

We all arrived on the Thursday afternoon or evening keen to go.

I had met up with a friend of mine who was visiting the JB area also and he was to take two of our divers out with him departing from Callala Bay ramp.

All was ready so on Good Friday Mark and Vera met up with Greg Telfer and we met on the water near Longnose Point.





Out we headed to have a look at the seals etc. at Drum and Drumstick. Unfortunately once there it was a washing machine but we did look at the seals for a short time then headed back around top inside the bay.

We went to The Docks to see very clear blue water, we did a very nice dive here and after a cupper we did another near the inner tubes.

Back home after we went up to the Club for Thai tea.


On Saturday we met up again and dived the Bowen Island in beautiful clear warm water. We also met up with Hugh Thornton from the Club and he did a couple here with us and one of his mates. Quite clear water and plenty to see. 














We ended our trip with a nice dive back at Bowen Island on Monday before heading back to home.
