
We also came across Kraken's anchor, and divers (meaning we were still 100m or so from The Cake).


A great day out with fun company, as always. I look forward to getting back there (hopefully within the next decade). Someone else can organise it next year - my therapist says I need a break.

Bananas on Boats

On the fantastic Port Stephens dive trip last year, one of the divers on the boat (not a St Georgian!) pulled out a banana and started eating it. The looks of abject horror she received from both fellow divers and crew made her double check that she hadn't pulled out a hand grenade, or a disembow-eled cat or the like. It was explained to her that bananas were bad luck on boats. She shrugged, said she didn't know, and continued eating her morning tea.

So - in the interests of communication : Bananas + Boats = Bad Luck ! (apparently)

Even Harry Belafonte's career was never the same after he wrote the Banana-Boat Song (Day-o)...

What got me curious though, was why this was such a widely and strongly held superstition. I had thought that, apart from the obvious risk of slipping on discarded peels, it was just because Bananas tended to accelerate the ripening of other fruit stored nearby (which would be undesirable for long sea voyages, such as to Wedding Cake Island, or the Undola), but there are so many other (alleged) factors bolstering this belief :

- Because they spoil so quickly, bananas needed to be transported quickly to their destination. This led to risks being taken on the journey, and sometimes ships were lost. From a fisherman's perspective, the acceleration also impacted their ability to get a good catch. There are a whole swag of fishing -specific banana superstitions that are too numerous to cover in detail here (such as oil from banana skins being transferred by hands onto fishing tackle, spooking the fish...)

- When the stored bananas were heated en-route, they emitted a toxic / dangerous gas which was not safe for either man or vessel. It's not clear whether this gas is ethylene or something else as well (or whether in a confined hull the gas just displaced air and suffocated the sailors).

- The final 'evidence' for this crime, is that a venomous animal (such as a spider or snake) would sometimes hide in bunches and kill crewmembers. Bacteria has also been blamed for killing everyone on board.

- At a more anecdotal level, in the old days often when a top-heavy cargo ship did sink, sometimes the only flotsam remaining was a bunch of bananas on the surface.

Live aboard Trip December 2017 (not 2016)

Raja Amapat in West Papua

A number of the club's members have mentioned a liveaboard dive trip to Raja Amapat in West Papua is on their "bucket list"

I have kicked the ball with enquiries to Mermaid (boat Mermaid 1), Aggressor & Black Manta for December 2017, Sorong to Sorong. I mentioned a group of 8 as a carrot for discount. Below are basic details from replies received. The comparisons are based upon "budget" cabins. There are other "delux/ master cabins at a higher cost.

1. Mermaid 10 days - 9 nights 3 to 12 December 2017 3300 euros less 20% discount - 2640 euros - approximately AUS \$3900.

2. Aggressor 10 days - 10 nights 11 to 21 December 2017 US \$ 4500 - 8 guests, 7 paying & 1 free - 12.55 discount - US \$ 3900 - approximately AUS \$ 5250. In addition to being more expensive, the dates are close to Xmas.

3. Black Manta 8 days - 9 nights first Raja Ampat trip is 21 to 29 December 2017 rates yet to be determined but indication is approximately US \$ 3000 less 10% discount - US \$ 2700 - approx AUS \$ 3600 - shorter period & more expensive than Mermaid.

Six members have indicated they wish to do the Mermaid 1 liveaboard. Although 8 participants will attain the discount, it would be preferable to have at least 10 people indicate a willingness to overcome any late cancellations

Rather than list details of itinerary, boat facilities ets , "Mermaid Liveaboards" is an informative web site. There is also comment on trip advisor.

Please also note:

1. I shall not be doing a group booking & each person would have to book direct.

2. Should a participant withdraw after payment, it would be that persons obligation to find a replacement.

3. Air flights are additional cost
