MAN CHARGED OVER WOMAN'S DEATH June 29, 2005

A SYDNEY man has been charged with the murder of a 34-year-old woman after he turned himself in to police and directed officers to her body.

Police had to call in the fire brigade to break down the door to a unit on Slade Road, Bexley North, about 10.30pm (AEST) last night.

The woman's body was discovered inside, police said.

The 32-year-old Bexley North man, who turned himself in to Marrickville Police Station, was taken to Prince of Wales Hospital where he was treated for post-traumatic stress.

He was charged with the woman's murder and refused bail.

A post-mortem examination is being done on the woman's body to determine the cause of death.

The man will face Kogarah Local Court tomorrow.

The young woman was Kelly Hudson. Kelly was a close friend and work colleague of club member Barbara Sweetman and was known to Carina, Russell and myself.

The article fails to mention that Kelly leaves behind 3 children, a 15 year old boy and 2 girls aged, 10 & 5. Unfortunately the unit has been sealed (most of the contents have been or will be destroyed) leaving these 3 children in a desperate situation. When something such as this happens so close to home one must go cap in hand and seek help from anyone and everyone.

My reason for submitting this article is twofold. Firstly The Marrickville Bowling Club will be holding a benefit night next Saturday Night (9th July) to raise funds for these 3 kids so we are asking fellow members to come along and support us. Secondly if attending is not possible we ask you all to pledge a donation through Russell on 0412963527 or myself on 0419517285.The fate of these 3 kids is uncertain and they need every bit of help we can give them, so please help.

As Barb is not aware we are seeking your help and is understandably distressed at the moment please communicate through Russell or myself with regards to this tragedy

Diving with Dive Quest at Mulloway

Divers: Cost: \$420.00 Includes: 4 double dives, Second tank free, all air refills included, 5 night's accommodation with continental breakfast – cereals, milk, coffee, tea

Non Divers: Cost: \$25.00 per night accommodation – includes breakfast

Washout: If either of the days Monday to Thursday is a wash out, then either of the following applies: Dive Friday at no extra cost of extended stay and depart Saturday, or

Osborne Shoals (NOT) Boat trip report

What a magnificent day to be alive and going diving was a bonus.

11 divers met at the Yowie Bay ramp for an 8:00am departure.

Ian Gowan had a crew of five (Carol M, Robert M, Steve S, Heinz B and Paul Pacey - author)

Les Caterson had a crew of four (Joanne E, Louise F, John C, Graeme E)

The original plan was to dive the Osborne Shoals but our helmsman, Rob, had no sooner motored away from the ramp when unrest developed among the crew. The problem seemed to be that the crew didn't want to waste a glorious day like this on a dive site like the Osborne Shoals and began mumbling about Baron's Hut and other such diver tempting treats. Captain Gowan quickly realised he was in difficult situation as flogging a few recalcitrant crew members in the middle of Yowie Bay was going to be a problem - better to wait until we hit Bate Bay then flog them! Once we nosed into Bate Bay however the decision among both boats was unanimous head south for bluer pastures.

Team Scat decided that Baron's Hut was the go whilst we headed further south to the Marley Sponge Gardens and we would have made it too - if it were not for the big ugly waves making it uncomfortable for the crew. OK, back to Baron's Hut for us too.

I was told to hit the water with Steve and Heinz as the first team. Once in the water I realised that the viz was not as good as one would hope but on the bottom it turned out to be nearly 15 metres which was quite acceptable. I hadn't dived Baron's Hut for years and as the bottom appeared I remembered what a beautiful dive site this really is. I also remembered that my camera was still at home - dang! Baron's Hut is a great dive site because it's far enough from the cliffs and deep enough to avoid damage from the huge seas common along this coastline and yet it's shallow enough for an amazing array of sea life to colonise it. Sea Whips, sponges, ascidians, and some fantastic gorgonians are just some of the treats awaiting you here and the fish life ain't

too shabby either. 66% of our team also had the treat of seeing a Seal who came in for a quick look at the strange bubble blowing creatures before himself disappearing in a blast of bubbles. We did the chimney (it's either getting smaller or I am) and then wandered over to check out the split, passing Team Scat along the way. Carol also spotted a Pink Indian Fish near Les's anchor (there may have been two of them before the anchor arrived). I think a Pink Indian fish is a Red Indian Fish to a diver without a torch.

After the dive we had a quick run back to Shark Bay for morning tea. I was unprepared for this as this was my first boat dive with the club (it's also why I'm writing this report). As a Dive Club you guys would make great caterers, I was amazed at the variety and quality of the nosh. I'll definitely have to lift my game in the vittles department. Thanks to the kindness of the crew I didn't go hungry though.

I think everyone had a great day - I sure did.

He lead us through what felt like a commando style combat dive. We went up, down, around, under and through anything in our path. I don't think any of us had time to stop and catch our breath.
