On this fine night, Dave Burns, Dane Millanta, Eddie Ivers, Peter Trayhurn, Robbie Mapstone, Adam Florence, Kelly Jandik and I met at Windy Point which is just north of Oak Park. We headed east till we hit the sand and then followed the reef edge as it went south and east. The outward trip was not all that interesting, only one sea dragon being the highlight.

However, once we reached the area of Fish Soup (the outermost part of Oak Park) things changed. Here we saw another sea dragon as we turned around to head back. Along the way we saw a fiddler ray, an eastern shovel-nose ray, and a very small Port Jackson shark. As we approached the exit, I spotted a southern eagle ray. As I followed it with my torch, it turned and whipped around behind me, narrowly missing Kelly. One person it did not miss was Eddie, he was hit by it on his tank. I am sure that he had to clean his wetsuit extra carefully that night!

Back at the exit point we lingered for a while, with a huge wobbegong shark under a rock being the highlight. Other things seen on the dive included lots of yellowtail, small leatherjackets, seapike and lots of colourful nudibranches. Visibility was quite good, well in excess of 10 metres, and the water warm.

After the dive we headed to Shelly Beach where we set up the BBQ. Also with us were Maureen Ivers, Carol Mapstone and Ellie and Mellie Trayhurn. Mellie's highlight were the possums which came down to feed. Another great night dive.

COLOURS REEF

Sunday 9th January, 16 club members aboard 3 boats set out from Rose Bay boat ramp to dive Colours Reef. There was a bit of a swell outside the heads but not enough to deter 16 enthusiastic divers. "SeaJohn" then "Lescat" followed by Ian set anchor along the wall in 30 metres. I was on Ian's boat and buddied with Dane and Tom. Ian buddied with Louise. We were first down the line and headed east from the anchor to find the wall. Not to far we located not only the wall but also Michael and buddies from "Lescat". I'm not sure how long the wall is as there wouldn't be enough air to cover it from one end to the other in one dive. The wall reaches about 6-7 metres high from the bottom at 30 metes. Its important to watch your deco time on this dive as it will usually run out before your air does. That means good navigation is also important. As the name suggests, Colours is vast with colourful sponges everywhere along the wall. This was also aided by 25 metes vis and maybe even better at times. While the 3 of us were on our safety stop Ian and Louise splashed in and headed down the line. We climbed back onto the boat and patiently waited for the Ian and Louise to return. After about 20 minutes I thought I noticed the light house east of our location had moved. It was either an ingenious feat of engineering or our boat had come adrift. We took a vote and agreed with the help of Michael sitting on Lescat waving us good bye that we had come adrift. We up anchored and headed back to where we began. Michael pointed in the direction of bubbles ascending from the depths which could only be the rest of our crew. A short time later Ian and Louise joined us at the surface and climbed aboard. Ian commented that he knew he was in the right place even though the anchor wasn't there and so decided to do a blue water ascent. The boats and crew all met up at Camp Cove for the usual post dive feast. All divers appeared to have enjoyed their dive based on the stories of great vis, heaps of fish and of course the wonderful colours found on the dive.

Viz 15m. Water dirty down to about 10m. Robyn & me saw heaps. Nudibranchs, serpent eels, blue morwong (which followed us most of the dive), big red morwong, grouper. Probably my best Osborne Shoals dive.

Viz about 10-12m. on the bottom. Dirty on the way down. Lots of starfish, cuttlefish, pullers, grouper and morwong. I took some pics that turned out ok.

Viz about 5-7m. Lots of sponges, one stingray, a few cuttlefish. Robyn & me saw a school of thousands of salmon on descent. This was John Connelly's first dive at this site.

Chuuk Lagoon Trip - Sept 2004 by Michael McFadyen

In last months addition referencing Martin, his computer and his Deco, in no way was any malice or criticism intended.

Part 2

By the time we arrived at the wharf (about 3.30 pm) I was in a bit of trouble. I could not walk due to the dizziness and threw up as I attempted to get off the boat. In the end, I had to be almost carried off the boat and was placed on the gear trolley and wheeled back to the hotel. Again, I had to be carried up the stairs as I could not stand.

Once on the bed, I was not too bad so long as I kept my eyes closed. The only thing was that I was still very hot and even the application of cool towels to my head did not cool me down. I drank a little water but I was not getting better. Around this time Kelly and Louise commented that back on the boat I looked like I had a rash on my stomach and on the backs of my thighs. However, the thigh rash seemed to have disappeared by now and it may have simply caused by the heat.

At this time I thought that I must have heat stroke, due to the way I felt. However, the longer I did not recover led me to suspect that this was not correct. At about 7.30 pm it was decided to put me on oxygen and after I had been on this for some time, I had no improvement (in my view) whatsoever. About 8.15 pm it was decided that I should go to the hospital as it was obvious I was not going to get better quick. I threw up again as I was put into the mini-bus.

At this stage, I should point out that back in 1998 when in Santo, I had a similar experience of dizziness. This cleared almost totally with a few hours and was later confirmed to have been a rupture of the round window between the inner and middle ears. The difference this time was that I did not have an ear that felt full of liquid, I had no hearing loss, I had no ringing in my ear and it was not getting better.

I was admitted to the hospital at 8.30 pm where I was examined by a doctor. His comments were that I was "conscious, coherent, co-operative, [I cannot read the next bits], not in acute distress". My vital signs were taken and were blood pressure 110/70 (normal for me), heartbeat of 88 (higher than normal for me) and respiratory rate of 16. By this time the rashes on the backs of my thighs were gone but there was still a rash on my stomach. My stomach was tender to touch. A neurologic examination showed that I was oriented to three spheres and was dizzy. I had well co-ordinated but weak muscle response. Other things were also normal. The only problem was when I sat up for one of the tests I threw up again. I also had some soreness on the upper arms but this was I am sure related to the tight wetsuit that I had been using for over 20 years and which had shrunk (and I had grown) to such an extent that it was very tight on me.

After this I was put on a saline drip and given one litre every two hours which was repeated when the first one was empty.

A more senior doctor was sent for and after a while he decided the he would contact DAN for advice. After speaking to DAN, I was sent to the new Hyperbaric Chamber which is down near the Blue Lagoon Resort. I arrived there at about 11 pm and threw up as I left the ambulance. Over the next three days I would have four treatments in the chamber, ranging from three to over five hours each go.

By the time the third treatment ended, I was feeling pretty good and that night I ate my first food for about 56 hours and even had a couple of beers. I could walk without assistance and only needed to occasionally steady myself against the wall. The next morning I felt really well. I considered was that I was 98% okay at this time, the only problem being a bit dizzy when being driven in a car. I even went for a walk up the road with Kelly. I had another treatment that day and after I felt almost 100%.

I feel that all of my improvement was not related to the treatments as I neither improved when taken to depth and the only improvement that occurred while I was in the chamber was because of the time that had passed rather than the treatment.

Was I bent? Who knows? All I can say is that I do not think that any improvement in how I felt came from the treatments, rather that I got better as time went on. It should be noted that all medical books on diving illnesses state that it is extremely rare to have inner ear DCS when breathing air (if I was bent, it had to be inner ear DCS as it is the only one that causes dizziness). Nearly all such cases are when people are using helium mixes. Personally, I think that perhaps it was a combination of illness and the extreme heat of the day.

As can be imagined, this was the end of my diving for the holiday. I did five dives and missed 17! I ended up not diving for six weeks, two weeks more than recommended by Dr Lee.

Kelly had been with me all the time I was in the chamber. Unfortunately, this was not just because she wanted to look after me, she had a case of the flu and was unable to equalise her ears so she would not have been able to dive anyway.

While this was all happening to me, the others kept diving, doing some excellent dives.

On Thursday 9 September most of the divers decided to have the day off and Bruce hired a four wheel drive for us to explore the island. Phil, Heinz, Bruce, Martin, Kelly and I went all over the place. We climbed up to the cave that overlooks the main part of the town. This cave has a huge Japanese gun that was to protect the town from attacking ships. From here we went to find a waterfall. After some rough driving we arrived at a spot where some local girls showed us a creek. What a disappointment, the water was filthy and the waterfall nothing more than a small series of rapids. It later turns out that this was not the waterfall, but we never did find it. From here we went to the old Japanese command base which is now the Xavier High School. We were going to go to the Japanese Lighthouse (which we could see from the school) but we were told it was a US\$10 per person entry fee, a bit steep we reckoned.

After this we looked for a way back along the southern coast to the Blue Lagoon Resort but after a few kilometres we came to a dead-end and locals told us the road still did not extend the whole way.

We headed back to town the long way and had lunch at a small restaurant opposite the hotel. Not bad. Later that afternoon a few of us decided to go to Blue Lagoon to have a swim at their beach. This was very nice.

It was now Friday but I decided not to go out on the boat just in case I became seasick due to some remaining dizziness. The rest mostly dived the *San Francisco Maru*, truly the best dive in Chuuk and the *Hoyo Maru*.

This was Dick and Ida's last day so that night we all went to Blue Lagoon for sunset drinks and dinner. A nice change of scenery and food.

The next day I went out on the boat. They again dived the *San Francisco Maru* but unfortunately for Kelly, her ears played up and she could not do the dive. After that we snorkelled the *Hino Maru No 2* (also known as Gun High Wreck) and then they dived the *Sankisan Maru*, another fantastic wreck.

The next day most dived the huge *Aikoku Maru* and then the oil tanker *Shinkoku Maru* with a snorkel on the *Susuki Patrol Boat 34* in between.

It was now 14 September and I came down a bit crook so I did not go out on the boat. The others dived the destroyer *IJN Fumitsuki* and the *Hanakawa Maru*. Kelly also did a night dive that night on the *Shinkoku Maru*, catching up one lost dive.

The trip was nearing its end, so the last planned dive day was on the *San Francisco Maru* and the *Nippo Maru*. That night we went to the Blue Lagoon again but the food and service was nowhere as good as the previous time (2.5 hours to have dinner).

For a change, the next day's diving was not to be on wrecks. Some of the group decided to do extra dives and Kelly caught up two more dives. The diving was out at North East Pass where the visibility was fantastic. While I was snorkelling, I could clearly see the divers at over 32 metres, even see what they were taking photographs of. The second dive was a shark dive. There were lots of grey reef and white tipped reef sharks, but not as many as normal. Again, I could see all this from the surface.

For our final night in Chuuk, we decided to put on a party for the dive guides. We bought some beers and ordered pizzas and sat out on the wharf with most of the dive guides till there was nothing left (we drank and ate a lot!).

The final day we did a little local sightseeing before heading out to the airport and the flights back to Guam and Cairns. Here we transferred to a hotel.

The next morning saw Peter, Phil and Bruce leave early for home while the rest of us (Louise, Eddy, Heinz, Daryl, Martin, Kelly and I) moved to new and different hotels. On Saturday 18 September Martin went home while Eddy, Louise, Heinz and Daryl went on a dive trip out to the reef. Kelly and I went whitewater rafting at Tully (145 km south). The next day Eddy and Louise went on the Kuranda Rail and Skyrail trip (which we had all done before) and the rest of us hired a car and spent the day going to Cape Tribulation.

Finally, on Monday 20 September, we all flew home to Sydney.

All in all, it was a very good holiday, although for me it was obviously not the greatest I have had for diving.

Thanks to Kelly, Eddy and Louise who spent considerable time waiting for me at the chamber as well as Phil, Bruce and others who attended to me before and at the hospital.
