COMING UP

THURSDAY NIGHT DIVES

A reminder that the Club has a night dive every Thursday night. These dives continue to be very popular.

Recent Thursday night dives have produced some very good dives. On 14 April Michael, Kelly, Ian, Eddie, Jason and Rox met to dive the mainland at La Perouse. The plan was to enter the water on the eastern side of the bridge and swim west, exiting near La Perouse Point. While all divers started off on the right track, Eddie soon convinced Ian that they were going the wrong way and they back tracked under the bridge and dived the eastern side of Bare Island. Jason and Rox did something similar. Michael and Kelly were the only ones to complete the plan and they reported a very good dive. Lots of sea dragons, squid, octopus and leatherjackets were seen and the visibility was about 7 metres even though it was low tide.

On 21 April Michael, Kelly, Adam, Eddie and Ian dived Lilli Pilli baths. The water was warm (21C) and about 5 metres viz. Michael reported seeing 63 White's sea horses, the most any of them had ever seen there before. As well, lots of small leatherjackets were seen and one small blue-ringed octopus sighted. Afterwards, a great pizza was enjoyed at the South Caringbah pizza place. Other recent night dives have included Shiprock.



The visibility was about 12 metres as usual lots of fish on the wreck. All reported a very good dive.

Club Dive Sunday 10th April South Tabbagi

On a warm and sunny Sunday, the scene at the Kyeemagh ramp was one of controlled chaos as 18 divers readied themselves and four boats (Le Scat, Ian's No Name, Seajohn and Dave v's) for a 8am departure.

The location of the dive was to be Minmi Trench. However as the boats made their way across Botany Bay it became apparent to those on board that the prevailing easterly swell would not make for a pleasant dive at the original site. Michael called a halt at the mouth of the bay while conditions were assessed.

It was decided to head south to Kurnell and re-check the conditions there. After some more to-ing & froing and some yes / no decisions we finally dropped anchor in a rough square pattern south of Tabagi Gap in about 26m.

Those of us on Ian boat split into two groups. The first comprised Robyn Hewitt, Craig & Eddie Ivers. In they rolled but Eddie was having difficulty with his mask & Ian & myself thought we saw a shape on the surface some 30m behind the boat. If it had been Eddie we didn't want to be in the water & find we had to institute a missing diver search. As it was all three returned safely to the boat's shot line. Once we were certain of this we geared up & rolled over to be met by warm water (23 degrees) &15m vis.

The bottom was sand interspersed by rock shelves and ledges. Not much in the way of fish life seen but at the 22m mark Ian sighted a small banjo ray in the kelp. On the sandy patches there lots of solitary purple sponges some having small red eastern cleaner cling fish on them. There were plenty of nudibranchs, sponges & encrusting algae's as we swam north to the wall. This feature runs east / west and is approx 2 ½ m in height.

After exploring the wall Ian reeled us back to the anchor. In doing so, we were overtaken by Dave V's anchor and chain. As we were resetting his anchor a large cuttlefish appeared to check out proceedings. The end of Ian's reel lay on the sand and I think the cuttle thought it was food & moved into check it out. I moved in with the torch and shooed him away. After 33mins on the bottom we ascended to deco after pulling the pick and flying south with the current.

On surfacing and sorting out the gear we headed back to Congwong Bay to meet the other boats for morning tea. All around us in the water and on the steps and rocks around Bare Island were divers. The good conditions certainly brought out the divers.

We mentioned our cuttlefish encounter & everyone mentioned that during their dives they too had seen some large ones. John Bedi remarked that it was the beginning of their mating season and during this time they become amorous / vicious & protective. The dive and area were then further discussed.

After gorging ourselves we all headed back to the ramp which was a crazy scene to pull the boats out & proceed to our various commitments for the rest of the day.

JERVIS BAY TRIP - EASTER

club).

The first day saw us head out on Le Scat with Michael, Kelly and Peter Trayhurn. 5 divers and 4 cameras anchored off the north end of Bowen Island, nothing was going to get past us undocumented.

We had been warned of long weekend's spent anchored of Bowen Island. Due to the conditions on the first day Sea John went fishing instead. There was a decent swell but we enjoyed 20+ metre vis on the 2 dives we did.

We had an interesting time with Peter when Les Scat started drifting while Michael and Kelly were underwater. Fortunately our extensive boating skills were not required.

On the second day Le Scat and Sea John ended up anchored off the northern end of Bowen Island (there is definitely a pattern emerging here). We saw an impressive 2+

metre wobbegong, apparently they grow to more than 3 metres but this was big enough for us.

The weather was pretty bad on this day so we called it quits after one dive. Sea John stayed around for a second dive. John B, Heinz, Ray, John Greig and Mike Scotland were onboard Sea John.

The two of us visited the Lady Denman Heritage Complex in Huskisson in the afternoon – named after the Sydney ferry now at rest there. They have a dive suit from the early 20th century that was used by 3 generations of the same family (imagine getting that kind of mileage out of a wetsuit!) as part of the oyster industry. No weight belt required the boots are made of lead.

On the 3rd day we headed out on Le Scat with Michael & Kelly and Dick and Eda. Leaving the charter boats behind at Bowen Island we headed around Point Perpendicular for a dive at the Arch.

Michael and Kelly went first. When we got down we pottered about on a narrow reef with lots of blue water around it. Then Michael and Kelly, on their ascent, helpfully pointed out that the dive is more interesting in the Arch right below us.

As we came back towards the anchor Dick and Eda had just descended wearing the same blank expressions that we did. We were able to point out with some authority that they were also right on top of the Arch.

Michael & Kelly were lucky enough to be visited by a seal on their safety stop. We, however, were greeted by a jellyfish - not quite the same somehow.

Le Scat shuttled Dave B, Phil and Jane Tuckerman (two of St George's oldest members who hadn't dived with the club since the early 90's) out to the Docks while we had a surface interval.

The second dive was at Point Perpendicular. Dave B joined us in place of Eda. Dick was concerned that his new buddy couldn't get them back to the anchor. To reassure him Dave took a line and reel. However he didn't

attach it to the anchor line so it must have been just for luck.

Dave Vandervelden had arrived by the 3rd day with his boat and he and Peter T got 2 dives in. Sea John did the Arch first and then went further north to the TSS Wandra for their second dive.

On our last day we were back at Bowen Island. "No!" we hear you say but its OK this time we were on the Eastern side at a site called Pyramid Rock. We can confirm that the 2 Deep Six boats and the live-board stayed at the Northern end of Bowen Island for all 4 days (and someone said there was a benefit to diving with a club?).

Le Scat received a few compliments over the weekend on the new paint and new engines. The guy from the liveaboard must have been envious, because after complementing the new paint job he offered to come over and rub up a bit – "...just to give her that used look". We didn't think that Les would like that idea.

Sea John and Dave Vs' boat were also at Pyramid Rock on the last day. So after one dive with more great visibility 15-20 metres we called it a day and everyone started organising their way back. Sea John stayed around for a second dive.

On the non-diving side a lot of good food was shared and we tried to convert the carnivores with Rox's Olive Salad. With little success however as the bbq blazed away all weekend, largely due to the massive tree that Peter dragged back for fuel.

The compressor competed with the lawnmowers all weekend in the back shed (even when Heinz tried to lock us out). It certainly made going all the way to the dive shop for a fill seem like a waste of time and it's cheaper too. So big thanks to Michael for that.

Dave V had to bare the brunt of Dave B and Peter T trying to bargain on everything – "I didn't really stay here", "Can't I get a deal for more people" etc. – the boys attempting to get an angle on a discount.

And finally on the diving side Jervis Bay helped dispel two myths for us. Eastern Blue Devil Fish are rare and secondly you only see them in caves. No, in Jervis Bay you see them every dive and they live out on the sand – or so it was this weekend.

Needless to say on our first trip with St George we had a great time and got a taste of the many very good dive sites at Jervis Bay.

Eddie and Sheila also reported a very nice dive. Afterwards, morning tea was on Mark Ridsdale's yacht anchored at Jibbon Beach.
