I have wanted to dive with Les and the mid-week gang for months now. Family scheduling challenges or late bookings had always prevented me from participating in the Wednesday dives. On April 9 the family was out of town and I seized the opportunity to go.

We saw the usual variety of fish and a cuttlefish that alternated between fear of my exhaust bubbles and a desire to attack my orange dive gloves.

I was expecting another short ride back to the boat ramp and a few brief farewells, but there was another surprise in store. I don't like to eat before I dive and the combination of exercise and hypothermia leave me famished at the end of the day. We stopped short of the boat ramp in a protected cove and instantly people started pulling out food from every corner of the boat. Cheese rolls, sweet rolls, sandwiches, crisps, soup, tea and coffee; I was stuffed by the time we pulled anchor and headed back.

If you have time or can make time on Wednesday mornings before lunch I recommend making the trip. I give it two thumbs up.

Oak Park is a great dive for people who like to see lots of interesting underwater life among its rocks, reefs and overhangs. From tiny, active brittle stars to the really big Giant Cuttlefish hovering near the divers, the dive was endlessly fascinating.

One of the highlights of the dive came early, at least for me, when we came across a juvenile Smooth Flutemouth, which seemed quite happy to pose for the camera. Not far away were a couple of small Weedy Seadragons, nearly blending in with the kelp. A bit further on was a Common Stingaree with the great misfortune to be missing its tail.

The half-way mark was notable for its very large flathead, well camouflaged with the sand. On the way back we came across an octopus, determinedly trying to be part of the reef it had latched on to. And just near the end was a large and impassive Sergeant Baker perched on its pectoral fins.


loading & jostling for launching spot & car space the intrepid crews headed set out over the flat harbour water for North Head.

Some of these areas were covered by encrusting algae's, while others boasted a fine array of thin orange fans & lemon finger sponges. On one rock was a small "new" flatworm which was eagerly photographed by Rox.

It was clear that all was Ok as both were on the deco line - so up came the anchor and we started the drift aided by a 5 knot westerly - after a drift of 700 metres from the site and 1hour and 20 minutes of elapsed time since I got back on the boat, John Prior exited the water and announced that Eddie's 2nd computer still had 5 minutes to go.

Well Ed, if you do the Tuggerah again you will have to go in first so that we can have lunch before 1.30pm next time!!!

Tuggerah - Saturday 12th May 2007. Six hardy soles set out from Yowie Bay on Le scat with Michael at the helm. Les, Shiela, Michael, Kelly, Peter Flockart and myself. The conditions were even better than the week before with blue skies, no wind, and almost glassy seas. Les and Shiela were first in, followed by Peter and myself.
