### St. George Scuba Club weekend dive trip to Merimbula and Eden. Friday night May 14th to Sunday May 16th 2010.

The main attraction for divers at Merimbula is the easy access to dive the three tug wrecks – The Empire Gladstone, the Henry Bolte and the Tasman Hauler. Even if you are not a wreck diver I believe that these wrecks are covered in marine life and attract hoards of fish too. The Empire Gladstone and the Tasman Hauler were specially prepared as diving wrecks so it's safe to go inside them even if you're not a die-hard wreck freak.

This trip will be a two day trip including two nights accommodation (Friday and Saturday night) and 2 double boat dives on Saturday and Sunday (4 dives total).

Note that the club program shows that this trip is scheduled for 21st – 23rd May. We had to move the trip forward one week because somebody else grabbed our proposed weekend first.

We will be diving and staying with Merimbula Divers Lodge (MDL).

There are a few other diversites in the area as well - check out the MLL vebsite for more information.

The accommodation is at the thre shop indifference three apartments each of which can accommodate eight divers.

The cost is \$260 per diver for accommodation, all air fills and 4 boar dives. If we get 8 divers then we get a "free of

charge" which then brings the cost down to \$227.50 per diver. This is almost cheaper than staying

home and cutting the grass. If you want Goofy Gas (up to 40% EAN available) then that will cost you an extra \$6 per fill.

The tugs are in no more than 30 metres of water. The water should still be warm-ish in May.

I have tentatively booked 8 spots – please get your deposits into Mark ASAP.

I'll work out dining arrangements after I make a visit to MDL early next year to eyeball their cooking and dining facilities.

### <u>NORTH HAVEN NEWS – (IT'S BACK ON THE CALENDAR)</u>

#### HI ALL,

Due to an urgent knee operation to me in mid April I cannot make it to North Haven in early July 2010 for a week. (Yes - not happy - John)

**Plan "B"** - My crew are happy to dive with Peter from "SCUBAHAVEN" divers and he has given me a good price of **\$65 per day, per person** for a double dive (this also includes 2 air fills in the price) this super price is for diveable days only. We now have minimum of 5+ divers with a maximum of 10 divers (to fully book his boat a 7.5M aluminium hull "Orca" with twin 140hp outboards - so you can dive anywhere without any local (divers). Please see his **web site** for all information



regards the local dive sites – The main ones are the - **COD GROUNDS** – The largest site off the N.S.W. coast for big grey nurse sharks (100 sharks have been seen here in a single dive about 7 km's from the river entrance and only 18M deep) and the wreck of the **"TITAN**" crane in 40M. Other sites include Perpendicular Point which is just south and the reefs north off Lake Cathie / Bonny Hills.

His boat has been booked for the Sunday the 4<sup>th</sup> to Friday the 9<sup>th</sup> a total of 6 days of diving total cost \$390 with air. Subject to that you can dive all 6 days (weather wise)

# -Recent Club Happenings-

## <u>Kiama diving and Camping trip report – 6<sup>th</sup> – 7<sup>th</sup> March 2010</u>

Attendees: Michael and Kelly McFadyen, Ron Walsh, Peter Flockart, Clara Kelleher, Deborah Cook, Ian and Sharon Gowan, Shaun and Sharon Reynolds, Andrew (Fang) Moulang, Robert Walker, Paul.Pacey (scribe).

When Michael planned a weekend trip incorporating a salt water dive, a freshwater dive, overnight camping and (maybe) some bushwalking, I thought "Wow, that ticks most of my boxes! Put my name down".

Some people wanted to add canyoning, sky-diving and a bull fight to the list but there's only so much you can fit into a single weekend.

The weather on the Friday was not good (overcast, showers, etc.) but we awoke on Saturday morning to clear blue skies and, more importantly, no wind.

The drive from Sydney to the dive site at Kiama harbour was pleasant with only a small amount of fog on the freeway.

When I arrived at the Kiama Harbour dive site I walked down to the entry point on the south side of the swimming pool to check the conditions. A cursory glance registered "hey, no worries".

I then wandered back to the cars to talk the other insomniacs who had also arrived early.

Conversation was difficult though as the local vintage motorcycle club was using the car park as the starting point for one of their rallies. Needless to say there was a lot of engine revving and "Grecian 2000" around.

Once our Fearless Leader arrived we all wandered down to the entry point to have a "group look".

Hmmm, this time when we looked, it didn't look nearly as easy to enter as when I first looked. So, it just goes to show that, just like playing the stock market, safe diving has a lot to do with timing! Consensus was that it was safe as long as you were careful and also made of steel.

Of course everyone entered the water safely and I was pleased to be voted "most inelegant entry" for my belly flop/face-plant combination entry. Thanks guys.

This is my second shore dive outside Kiama Harbour and I've got to say, it's a pretty dive site but in a barren kind of way. It's pretty because of the interesting rock strata and it's a relaxing dive if the visibility is good. Luckily the visibility on the dive was excellent at over 15 metres (until we got down to about 16 metres depth where we hit a wall of dirty water). The rock in the area is basalt and it's harder than steel (they use it as "blue metal" to make concrete). So there is not much weathering of the rock to create caves, crevices, etc (except for the nearby "Kiama Blowhole"). This means that there are not many places for small critters to hide so you don't see teeming schools of predator fish hanging around waiting for an easy feed. Also, there is hardly any sponge/ascidian life either.

Maybe the seas are too rough or maybe the basalt rock is to blame? There were some small schools of One-Spot Pullers and some Sergeant Bakers lying around. The sand filled gutters attract many types of rays. We saw a couple of small Eagle Rays, many Common Stingarees, and a few Banjo Rays.

On my previous dive here I found a Blind Shark but no such luck this time. I noticed Andrew pick up an old fishing reel along the way. The thing had obviously been underwater for years. After studying it for a while he decided that no amount of time, energy or money would resurrect it - it's still on the bottom outside Kiama harbour. Michael navigated us to the harbour entrance and then we cruised around the inside of the harbour on the south eastern side.

I find it's a bit unnerving to look up at the fishing people on the harbour wall above you and wonder where their lines and hooks are deployed! I'm sure they see our bubbles and think...(hmmm, let's not go there).

An easy exit via the cobble-stone divers exit ramp at the harbour entrance, a cold shower in the amenities block and we are ready for coffee in town with all the other tourists. Many of us settle for a coffee and a deco-pastry. Fang goes for the "Big Breakfast" and manages to finish it before the rest of us have emptied our coffee.

Our final destination was to our secret camp site on the escarpment. But first we needed to investigate the view from Saddleback Lookout. It was such a beautiful day and the view north overlooking Jamberoo and to the east over the coastline was simply stunning. What a beautiful country we are blessed with. Highly recommended.

Upon arrival at our secret campsite we discovered that it's not really all that secret. There were two other groups already setup for the night. Luckily, the camping section that was still available was perfect for our group. Some people set about having lunch whilst others sorted out their camping arrangements for the night. Many of the club members are keen campers and it was interesting to see the variety of camping equipment being used. Sleeping quarters varied from swags, dome tents, hike tents and the tree-top campers of Kelly/Michael and Ron.

The next task was to rinse the dive gear by going for a dive in a nearby freshwater pool.



We first sent Andrew in with his mask and snorkel to test the toxicity of the water. Every time Andrew surfaced it reminded me of the film "Creature from the Black Lagoon". After Andrew survived for a few minutes the rest of us deemed it safe to enter the water. This was quite a treat as the viz was surprisingly good (maybe 3 metres) and I was amazed at how many critters were to be seen.

There were small freshwater shrimp about 40mm long.

Later on around the campfire, there was some discussion about whether they were shrimp or yabbies. I could not see any nippers so I'm calling them freshwater shrimp, especially since I'm writing this article!



There were also underwater flies - no, I am not making this up. These critters actually "flew" around in the water column using their wings – really weird. Their buoyancy control was absolutely amazing. There were also small water spiders and some really ugly bug-eyed things wandering around on the bottom. I also managed to find a car battery (flat) and the front mudguard off a '76 Ford Falcon.

Before dinner, some of the guys set off in different directions to explore the walking trails in the area. The trails do not cover a large area but the walking is very pleasant and the walk grades are very easy. Again, highly recommended.

The next challenge was to organise dinner. I realised that I brought the gas bottle for my BBQ – this was good.

## Big Cat Reality Trip Jan 15 to 20 by Mike Scotland.

I boarded the boat at Bundaberg Qld. We steamed to Lady Musgrave Island overnight arriving at dawn. The first dive at Manta Ray bommie was excellent.


No mantas but lots of fish, especially Angelfish, Coral trout and Coral Cod.

We had five dives that day all of which were outstanding. The water was around 25 degrees and clear with enough current to get the fish active and liven up the diving. The corals around here seemed to be healthy and the fish life had



definitely benefited from the protection of the GBRMNP.

From here we sailed to Lady



Fairfax to dive on the North wall.

We saw big green moray eels, a friendly Cow-tail ray and some huge turtles. The night dive here was excellent with sleeping Parrotfish and Barramundi cod. In the morning we dived on a Cabbage coral reef with schools of millions of baby Cardinal fish, Red Emperor and a Leafy Scorpion-fish.

After breakfast we sailed to Hoskins reef where we went for a walk on the island and a snorkel in the lagoon instead of the afternoon dive. This was a bit of a waste of a dive as far as I was concerned but it was pleasant enough.





Next stop was Llewellyn Island. Three semicircular angelfish were feeding off the anchor chain as it rubbed the coral. Another spot at the same island had very strong current but it was a sensational dive with wall diving and caves every now and again.

The caves were covered in Yellow daisy coral and black coral trees.Our next stop

was Lady Elliot Island. We had crystal clear blue water and sunshine all the time here.



Sleeping arrangements are two large, long airconditioned cabins, each sleeping 12 people. Big challenge for romantic couples! The food is basic good tucker but has plenty of salad and fruit and vegs and heaps of it. To further enhance the dive, manta rays kept getting in the way of Coral cod and Mantis shrimp and giant Loggerhead and Green Turtles. I followed two Imperial angelfish around the bommie. The Blowhole was another wonderful dive!

The boat is 37 years and used to be a floating hotel and sometime brothel. It is well looked after and has a good skipper.



The dive rules are very strict and you get the same treatment whether you are a novice diver with 20 dives or a veteran instructor.

I finally realised why Bob Halstead calls his dive column in Dive Log, The Adult Section. He always talks about treating experienced guest divers as adults with commonsense. Sadly, the Big Cat failed miserably on this score. Be warned!



Anyway apart from this problem, the crew did go out of their way to give us the best diving each day and made an extra effort on the last day to give us 3 dives before steaming back to Australia. I did 21 dives in five days.
