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
-Recent Club Happenings-

We had another great night socializing with both old & new club members while enjoying a great meal.




This was followed by a plate with a slice of ham / turkey & beef plus roast veggies.

<u>Jervis Bay weekend Fri 20 – Sun 22 August 2010</u>

Trip report – Paul Pacey (added to by Natasha Naude)

The house, located in Vincentia, was tricky to find – but the search is worthwhile as it's a great house for groups such as ours. Fifteen people were accommodated quite comfortably, with a great kitchen, fireplace, and giant spa bath we neglected to make use of.

Dinner on Friday night was at the local Vincentia bowling club, conveniently located in the same street as the house and inconveniently located at the top of the hill! The food is Chinese and Thai and was delicious and the service fast and friendly – highly recommended. To top it all off, Mark won a meat tray which provided all the ingredients for bacon and egg rolls for lunch on Saturday.

Saturday morning arrived with a clear blue sky but a strong north westerly wind. This was perfect for our requirements as we wanted to dive outside the bay and the small swell (1 metre) and westerly winds make it perfect for diving the caves and other sites close in to the cliffs outside the bay.

There were 10 of us diving – sadly Michelle, Carol and Tricia all couldn't make it into the water.

We arrived on time to meet the boat at Murrays Beach boat ramp - the only problem was that the boat wasn't there.

The Murrays Beach boat ramp was closed for maintenance and Steve (from Ulladulla Dive Centre) had planned to launch the boat at Hyams Beach and then drive across the bay to meet us at Murrays. This was a great plan until Steve discovered that there was no way he could get the boat in at Hyams boat ramp and then had to drive all the way back to Curambene Creek near Huskisson to launch the boat.

Whilst waiting for Steve to arrive we were able to enjoy the full force of the cold gale blowing in from the North West. Once Steve arrived the boat was quickly loaded, the paperwork was completed and we were on our way to dive with the seals at Steamers Head. When we arrived there were about 25 seals sitting impatiently on the rocks as they obviously hadn't heard about our late arrival. Whilst we geared up, Steve and Jason (our DM) whooped and hollered which the seals obviously didn't like listening to as they jumped into the water for some peace and quiet. We then jumped in to enjoy the show. Actually I think we



put on the show as there were divers doing somersaults, twists, rolls and other goofy manoeuvres which the seals easily copied, only with speed and grace. This is one of life's great experiences which should be on everyone's "bucket list". The whole trip was worth doing for this dive alone. Ron has put some great photos on the club website. After the dive we motored in to Steamers Beach for morning tea and to try and get out of the wind which had swung south and the wind chill had dropped to below freezing.

For our second dive we headed to Spider Cave which we do not often get a chance to dive due to sea conditions. No problems this day, as the conditions were perfect (except for the water

temperature being 15 degrees). The visibility was also excellent at 20 metres.

Off to the cave we went – alas, no spiders were seen but it was a very pleasant dive in there anyway. There were three huge Wobby's sleeping on the bottom inside the cave. After the cave experience we cruised the gutters, grottos and swim throughs in the cove. Once the icicles started to form we returned to the boat for a quick ride back to Murrays.

Once we had all returned to the house the main terrestrial event began – the great Jervis Bay curry cook up! On Lamb Saag we had Natasha, Debbie on Cardamom Chicken, Carol on Veggie Curry and Paul on Beef Rendang. Edward made a South African Kwa-Zulu Natal speciality – bunny chow (that's curry served in loaves of bread, for the uninitiated) and provided banana and coconut, roti and naan. Michelle couldn't dive but she and Olivier came for the Saturday night to meet everyone and brought along pappadums, chutney and made a great raita. Sarah brought along a case of wine to share. The support act was Mark cooking the pappadums and wine supplied by the great winemakers of Australia. A fine meal wouldn't be the same without dessert – Tricia had brought a huge cheesecake and of course there was chocolate mudcake to celebrate Natasha's birthday. The real and biggest thanks go to the clean-up team!

Sunday morning was looking even better as the wind had dropped considerably. Even better, we had a late start! After a lazy breakfast we again headed out to Murrays Beach and after loading the boat we were off to dive Smugglers Cave on the north side. As we loaded the boat and started off from the jetty we were joined by a whale, who waved a pectoral fin at us before disappearing. It was a great start to the morning. Although the swell had increased, the conditions were still excellent. After anchoring it wasn't long before we all were headed into Smugglers Cave, which was only 20 metres from the boat! The viz was awesome – over 30 metres! After perusing the cave for a while we cruised outside to enjoy the awesome visibility. Inside the cave the divers positioned themselves around the natural underwater

amphitheatre and looked as though they were watching some submerged ballet.

While back on the boat a huge pod of dolphins cruised past at a small distance, jumping out of the water and giving us an aerial display as they travelled down the coast.

After a pleasant morning tea in one of the small coves at Drum and Drumsticks we headed back south to dive The Labyrinth, stopping to chat with some more seals along the way. Steve and Karen (our DM for the day) were not sure exactly where the dive site was (they are from Ulladulla and are still learning) and they were using GPS coordinates. Some divers thought the site was north of where we anchored and some thought it was south. Despite our shotgun approach to finding The Labyrinth, only Ron found it, as it was quite a way north of the boat. It's actually just on the point and in 23 metres of water. We had a good dive anyway as there are lots of swim throughs and crevices to be explored around this area. Once again the visibility was fantastic and there was lots to be seen.

Many thanks to Natasha and Digby for organising a great weekend away for us – special thanks for organising the great diving conditions. Thanks also to the Master Chefs for providing the banquet dinner on Saturday night.
