LADIES WEEKEND JERVIS BAY 7 & 8 MAY 2022







Bega Lagoon, Fiji

Every now and then a much-hyped experience exceeds your inflated expectations. Shark diving Beqa Lagoon in Fiji last week was one of those rare occasions.

We did 4 shark dives kneeling behind a small wall at 20 metres supported by 8 courageous and experienced local dive guides. The dives were a blur of feeding frenzies, sometimes so close you had to dodge very large tail fins to avoid being hit.

On 3 of the 4 dives we had 5 – 6 tiger sharks including 2 very large 4 metre plus females. The tiger sharks don't always show up so we were extremely lucky. There were at least 10

- 12 bull sharks on every dive (impossible to say exactly how many) as well as lemon and tawny nurse sharks.

The visibility was also better than I expected allowing for great photography if you could avoid the clouds of fish photobombing your shots. Lifelong memories but not for the faint hearted.

Shiprock 1 June 2022

Shore dive at Shiprock on 1 June 2022 with Donna Walsh & Michael McFadyen. Classic winter diving conditions with brilliant sunshine but a cold westerly wind (some of us really need a beanie...). Visibility was average Shiprock at around 4m and the water temperature a toasty 17C. Did the usual explore to garbage gulch and around the bommies. Three pineapple fish, only one nudibranch - a black margined Glossodoris Doriprismatica atromarginata, several seastar shimps (Periclimenes soror) that Donna found, stars and stripes pufferfish, lots of leatherjackets, wobbygong sharks, tiger pipefish and schools of silver bream and yellowtail. Coffee and muffins after the dive in the sun was icing on the cake.

For those of you who take photos and want to use them for something positive, I have found iNatuarlist to be a great platform.

As well as being a citizen science based program which reaches scientists all over the world, it is a great personnel record of all your favourite photos. Sometimes its hard to remember where and when you took a certain photo, I find it easy to look up my iNaturalist observations to pin point a date.

When you load observations iNaturalist will give you suggestions on what species it could be, this is great if you have no idea what you have found. If you think you have found something really rare you can research how many other people have found the same animal in the same area.

This platform is not only for marine animals, it's for plants and terrestrial animals too, even from your backyard.

I recently videoed a flatworm taking a journey across a bigbelly seahorse, it started on the shoulder, made its way up over the seahorses gills, across its eyes and down the belly, poor thing was blinded and gagged! Link below to <u>https://www.inaturalist.org/observations/117560900</u>











