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Mermaid 2 Liveaboard Bali – Komodo Club Trip Part 1



I joined the group for the second leg of the Indonesia trip departing Benoa Harbour with some others having spent a week in Tulamben. The were 14 club members onboard - Maxine, Michael, Greg, Shelley, Kelly, John, Colin, Glen, Andrew, Aidan, Aga, Ron, Donna and myself. A big thanks to Kelly for organising it all and getting a great post COVID deal for us.



It takes a couple of days of overnight motoring to get to Komodo National Park from Bali. Once there you have a range of different dive sites from walls to reefs to drifts and muck night dives on sand. So much variety from little things to big things to see including a visit with the famous Komodo Dragons.

However on this trip one dive stood out over all the others. I have seen manta rays many times but not ever had an experience like this. Not only that but I had dived Takat Makasar before and only seen one manta momentarily, so I wasn't that excited to do it again. If you don't see mantas it's just a long shallow drift over coral rubble.



There seemed to be more boats in Komodo compared to last time we were here. A ripping

current for a drift was perfect for some great manta action. We jumped in and after a few minutes saw our first group of 3 mantas.



Our dive guide followed the snorkel boats that were cruising overhead. They had spotters to find the mantas and when they did a whole group of snorkelers would jump in. It really worked and we saw mantas throughout the dive and ended up leaving them below us at the end of the dive.

We had 20 -25 manta rays in 10 metres of water during the dive including my favourite black manta which looks like a shadow. The hardest thing was to claw onto the coral rubble and dig your fins in, in the current to hold your position and try to get some photos.

The word manta broadly means "blanket" in Spanish. Our Spanish trip director told me that in everyday use it refers to a fishing net that is designed like a blanket. All four of us on the dive got blanketed by a manta flying over the top of us at least once.

While waiting stationary on the reef our Indonesian dive guide Ardie got tapped on the head by a mantas wing tip as it passed by. He was sooooooo happy he called it, "The manta blessing".

Kelly had said before we started the trip that if we saw a manta we would know that our great friend Carol Martin, who we miss very much, was with us in spirit. In that case Carol was certainly with us on this dive.



This was one of my all time best dives, making memories! It's a great time to travel to Indonesia and enjoy the diving as well as their wonderful hospitality.

On the Saturday of the Boys Weekend to Port Stephens we take the Lets Go Adventures dive boat out to dive with the Sharks at Broughton Island. There are two main dive sites that we visit here - The Looking Glass and North Rock. This trip our first dive was to The Looking Glass. A bit of surge in the gap in the island but nothing that couldn't be managed. Unfortunately there there no grey nurse sharks here this time but at the entrance there were numerous Port Jackson sharks piled up on each other in the small overhangs. At the cave down from the Looking Glass was a nice eastern blue devilfish hanging in mid water and was quite unfazed by the visitors.

Our second dive was to North Rock. Poor visibility here at only 4-5m and a slight swell surge made navigation challenging for some. Those that found the gutters were rewarded with up to 7 grey nurse sharks casually swimming up and down the gutter in amongst the usual large school of eastern pomfrets. Add in more Port Jackson sharks and it made for an enjoyable dive.



On our recent trip to Komodo on the Mermaid II Liveaboard we were lucky to see Manta Rays on two dives. Both dive sites are in the Lintah Strait between Komodo Island and Rinca Island. Takat Makassar is circled in red on the above map. Mawan is circled in green.


Book Review




