Coolooli

19th July

I had booked two other deep dives this year but both had been cancelled due to bad weather. However the weather gods played ball this weekend - must have been because the pop was in town - & after a couple of days that looked crook we had a reasonable day for the deep dive. However of the four keen souls who turned out for this one was unable to get to the wharf due the insurmountable number of road closures around Sydney for the Popes' big do.

Peter F, Peter T & Paul Watkinson plus three others & Yves had waited an extra 20 mins but to no avail. So we proceeded at good speed from Rose Bay to the site of the Coolooli. I might add since Yves boat has been fitted with a new motor it is considerably faster than in the past. The trip to Long reef at 23knots took only 45mins.

Conditions weren't the best with slight SE swell & a cold WSW wind; however we were out & determined to make the most of the conditions.

The other divers on board were using rebreathers so we let them go first. St George dived as one group of three. Bottom time was to be between 15 & 18 mins although Peter T lasted only 12 mins due to gas constraints & the fact that in his haste to gear up had forgotten to attach his pony bottle to his BC - he had left it on board.

Paul W (unjustly maligned for failing to front for a previous dive) & myself had a great dive despite reduced bottom visibility (between 50 & 10m). We swam over the side & along the buckets passing two small black coral trees before continuing down & along to the bow. In the crevices & structural overhangs were clumps of pink jewel anemones small - blue dragon - nudibranchs. On the bottom under the "bow" were 6 large Port Jackson sharks. It is the first time I remember seeing PJ's on the wreck.

I did not see much fish life which is often a highlight of this dive.

It was a rather gloomy dive due to the lack of light but the torches helped in brightening up the dive. We passed the bow & swam along the port side corridors to the anchor to begin our ascent on 18mins. Deco was cool at around 15 degrees but we had had a good dive.

Back on board Yves served up hot Chicken noodle soup which with the increasing amount of "warmish" sunlight helped in returning our body temperatures to normal.

Carol and Ada who had set a new world record for longest time for females under water breathing from one tank, finally left the water just before the closed the gates at sunset, of course we waited for them.

After the dive, we sat down on the grassy hill near where we had parked our cars and began to eat lunch. We bagged all the club divers that were there, we bagged all the club divers that were not there, then were surprised by a colourful Jason Cooms all kitted up in Rox's new wetsuit! Rox was so livid that she decided that Jason was not worth diving with and feigned a broken fin strap so she could pull out of the dive. A fitting end to a Sunday dive.

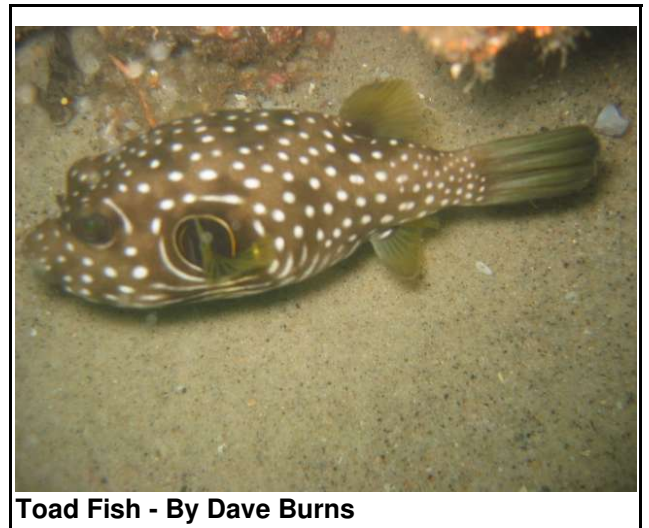
Swansea Bridge Dive

 Feeling adventurous - the following is some prices for a trip to the Simian Islands leaving Phuket for 4 days (5 Nights) on a liveaboard. Total of 4 days diving = 16 dives. the average cost per dive after discount assuming 28 baht :\$Aud is about \$56.00.I have dived with these guys before and now they have a new boat which looks great.
 Obviously it would be great to stitch this excursion with an extended holiday. There are deals to be done or alternatively those that wish to stitch their own deal due to frequent flyers and timeshares can do so.
 Indicative cost assuming Aud:28Baht and after 20% discount is detailed below.
 The boat with all in cost is \$900 - \$1000 for the 16 dives.
 Deals regularly offered is stay 8 nights, including airfares and transfers for about \$1300 - \$1400. Add some spending money (Guys add \$1.50, girls \$1500.00) and that would be about right. I guess a budget of \$3000 will see you sloshed, well feed and some tailor made gear to bring home.

Tank Testing

Heinz Bendinger will collect tanks for testing at the August meeting. The cost of testing is approximately \$15 but it depends on time taken so it could be a little more. To get such a cheap price, there are some conditions:

1. Remove tank boots, mesh, valve caps, carrying handles, tank bands, sling rings and limpet mines.

2. Evacuate air from tank completely and close valve.

3. Write your name on the valve and on the tank and indicate with a YES if you require an air fill. Use of masking tape or tags is good.

4. Come to the August meeting and bring your tank/s with you. If you can't make it to the meeting, find someone who will be attending to do it for you.

5. Tanks will be taken AFTER the meeting in the car park.

6. No deviation from the above will be entertained. If this does not suit your itinerary feel free to do it in your own time at greater expense.
