## Ship Rock Shore Dive

On a lovely sunny Australia Day, Paul, Ray, Andrew, Peter F, Brian, Eddie, Bram and a newbie, Narelle, met at Shiprock. Narelle got her Open Water certification in Thailand two months ago in warm clear water, falling off a boat.

This was her introduction to a different type of diving experience – not so warm, just passable vis, and a challenging walk down to the water and back.

Despite this, she enjoyed the dive, and will no doubt be back for more (if anyone has some gear they want to sell ...), as evidenced by this picture (unless she was desperately saying “take me up!!”):



When we first entered the water, just after high tide, visibility could be best described as non-existent. Unless your only diving experience was in 28 degree water in Thailand, the water temp was actually quite pleasant at 21 degrees.

Every now and then everything would go dark as a large boat passed very close overhead. The leatherjackets were prolific, along with a reasonably large school of pike (I think) and some nudibranchs.

As usual, the sponge life was a highlight of the dive. The most exciting sight for me, however was:



This was no dwarf Lionfish, but the full deal. It was about 25cm long. I have never seen a Lionfish this size in Sydney before.

By the time we got to the end of the wall and turned around, the current had kicked in nicely, making for a pleasant drift back to the exit. The dive was followed by a very sociable sausage and steak feast at Paul's place.

### Taking the big Leap!

When we hit the water the first thing we noticed were the icebergs. After diving Shiprock in balmy water on Saturday we were a bit shocked to hit 15 degree water at the entry point. Another issue seemed to be poor viz but this proved to be only in the first few metres and when we

approached the sandline at 18 metres depth the viz was a very tidy 10 metres.

There was some surge but nothing too ugly and we soon were on our merry way peering under rocks, hassling all sorts of critters but mostly just enjoying a very relaxing dive.

Sighted during the dive were all the usual suspects – Andrew bouncing across the bottom (I think he's partly an underwater grass-hopper), Morays, a Grouper or two (have you got some food?), plenty of LST's, some divers going the other way(?), one scrappy weedy seadragon, etc. etc.

Unusual thing we sighted were a Cuttle Fish trying to emulate a flounder as it flattened itself on the sandy bottom, and a "thing" clinging on a sponge. I still don't know what "thing" was but it was really pretty (which is always a good place to start – right?) it was about 40mm in diameter dark purple in colour with tiny orange spiracles all over it.

It wasn't quite round and even though it didn't have distinct arms it did seem like some type of echinoderm. The things you see when you haven't got a camera and Mike is nowhere to be found!

## Undersea Explorer Away Trip

Robbie Mapstone is organising another trip to the Great Barrier Reef and Osprey Reef on the liveaboard *Undersea Explorer*. There is an article on this web site and are lots of photos from previous trips in the Photo Gallery if you would like to see what the diving is like.

The dive trip starts on Saturday 10 May 2008 at Port Douglas and goes for 6 days, coming back to Port Douglas on Thursday 16 May. You will get the chance to do about 22 dives. You will need to stay in Port Douglas till at least the Friday afternoon before flying home.

The cost will about \$1728 (depends on numbers and discount) plus some costs on board (fuel levy, marine parks fee and any drinks you buy). This includes all food and dives.

You will need to organise your own flights to and from Cairns (there are Qantas and Virgin Blue flights about 10:30 am from Sydney) and should be able to get for about \$160 each way.
